SERVICE OF CANDLE LIGHTING...

SCRIPTURE Luke 2:15-20

After the scripture is read, the lights will be dimmed, and the minister will light a candle from the Christ Candle. The minister will then light the candles of the ushers, who will then light the candles of the first person on each aisle. Light will then be passed from worshiper to worshiper. Remember that the lighted candle remains upright and the unlighted candle is tipped to the lighted candle.

(The candle is held close to the breast)

Following the singing of Silent Night, Holy Night, the minister shall lead a silent recessional to carry the light outside, weather permitting. After everyone has gathered, we will sing the first verse of "O Come, All Ye Faithful"

Please use extreme caution in the handling of the lighted candles to prevent accidents with the hair or clothing of the person in front of you and the pews.

Children must be carefully supervised. For safety's sake, it is requested that children under six should "share" their parents candle.

Symbolism of the Lights

The significance of the Candlelight Service is twofold. First, in the distribution of the lights, we see dramatized before us the spreading of the Gospel Message and the growth of the church through the centuries. The pastor's candle is symbolic of Christ, the living Word, and is an extension of the Christ candle in the Advent wreath. The ushers who carry the light to the congregation represent the Apostles whom Christ sent out to spread the Word and draw the world to Him. The church has grown because men and women and young people who have heard the Good News have been faithful in telling someone else about it, and this is symbolized by your passing the light to the person beside you. The ushers will light the candle closest to the aisle. As each candle bursts into flame and the sanctuary gradually brightens, we catch the significance of Jesus' statement that we are "the light of the world," and that we should spread this light to the "very ends of the world." Secondly, we find significance in the lights during the singing of the dedication hymn. During the singing of the first verse, we hold our lights close as we rededicate ourselves to Christ. As we sing the second verse, we hold the candle out in front of us as we rededicate our homes and families once again to him. During the last verse, we hold our candles high as we rededicate our part of His church here to the task of taking the Gospel Light to every corner of the earth. After the Benediction, please extinguish your light. Receptacles for the spent candles are located in the narthex.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

WORSHIP SCHEDULE: We will have one worship service at 11:00 a.m. on Sunday, December 29. Our regular schedule resumes January 5th, with worship at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. and Sunday School at 10:00 a.m.

TONIGHT'S PRELUDE invites us to imagine the journey of the Magi, though not by means of traditional musical forms or harmonies. Instead, we enter a world of colors, imagery, feelings, and mysticism. This work will require a different, more objective way of listening, but as I live with this piece, it continually and quietly reveals more and more depth and profundity. I sincerely hope it will transport each of you to a deeper understanding of the Magi's faith in following the star as they traveled to Bethlehem to worship and adore the Child. Quoting from the overview of Olivier Latry's recording of the complete works of Messiaen: "Liturgical music celebrates God in his church," Messiaen said in a lecture given at the Cathedral of Notre Dame. "Religious music reveals him at all hours and all across our planet Earth, in our mountains and oceans, among the birds, flowers and trees, and even in the visible universe of stars that surrounds us." Aside from his highly cerebral compositional skill and all its complexity, including his own modes of limited transposition (essentially scales with non-conventional patterns of whole and half steps), his writing vividly evokes what the titles depict. In Les mages, it has been interpreted that the pedal line depicts the star and that the descending chords in the right hand represent the long, winding journey of the Magi (the chords are in three parts and grouped in threes, on several levels), accompanied by sustained, calm, and even hypnotic chords in the left hand, suggesting meditation as they traveled through the night. At the conclusion of the work, as they reach the manger, all three textures join (pedal and the two manuals) in a single chord.
